You may want to do some of these activities with your child.

Words, Words, Words

- Have your child cut out the word cards and read each word.
- Help your child think of words that rhyme with *eat*, *grows* and *two*.
- Give your child a clue about the meaning of each word. Have your child point out the correct card and read the word. For example, “This word means ‘get bigger.’”

Hop to the Music

Have your child describe how a frog grows, beginning as an egg, then growing into a tadpole, and finally developing into a frog. Ask your child how frogs move. Then put on some music and ask your child to hop like a frog while the music is playing. Stop the music and have your child freeze in place. Then start the music again so your child can continue hopping. Your child may want to invite friends or relatives to play this musical hopping game too.

Encourage your child to read for at least 30 minutes outside of class each day.
