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Your application for Free or Reduced priced meals for your child or children has been processed on 9/13/2004. The application was approved for free meals.

If your child/ren are eligible for PAID MEALS - the cost for breakfast and lunch is \$1.60 for elementary, \$1.00 for secondary per meal per child and \$1.80 for senior high, per meal per child. NOTICE: If your child/ren have been approved for FREE or REDUCED MEALS and choose to bring a meal from home and plan to have milk with their meal; MILK/JUICE IS PROVIDED AT NO CHARGE ONLY IF YOUR CHILD/REN ARE EATING BREAKFAST.

If you do not agree with the decision, you may appeal it with a school official. If you wish to review the decision further you have a right to a hearing. If your child is approved for free meals and your household income is more than \$50 a month, or your household size decreases. If your child is approved for meal benefits based on eligibility for AFDC you must tell the school when you no longer receive Food Stamps or AFDC for your child.

You may reapply for free meals any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a decrease in household income, become unemployed, or have an increase in household size, you may fill out another application at that time.
