Dear Sir:

Your letter of December 24th, addressed to Mr. McConnell, Commissioner of Education, has been referred by him to this department, with a request that we reply directly to you.

Therein you submit briefly the major facts concerning three children attending your school and inquire as to the legal residence within the district of these pupils.

The question of residence is one of fact and not of law, and this office cannot undertake to determine the same. It most dvise only on questions of law.

At most, we can only give you certain general suggestions that may be of assistance in determining the fact.

The right of a child to attend school without
the payment of tuition depends upon whether its legal
residence for school purposes is within the district. Such
residence may be separate and distinct from the residence
of his parents or parent. No definite rule of law can
be given that will solve the question in all cases. Generally speaking, however, it may be stated that if the
presence of a child within the district is for the purpose

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only of attending school, and the care and attention which it may receive is incidental to that purpose, such child is not a resident of the district, and may be required to pay tuition. On the other hand, if it is within the district for the general purpose of receiving personal care, attention, supervision and nurture, such as is usually provided in a home, such child is a resident of the district. The fact that the parent may pay for such services, or may contribute regularly for the support and maintenance of the child, is immaterial. Thus, it will be Observed that the general purpose and object of its presence within the district is the controlling factor. All of the surrounding facts and diroumstances must be taken into consideration in determining the question. office cannot undertake to determine the question upon the bere facts stated, even if it were within the scope of its functions to determine questions of fact.
